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# Explaining your result notification



## Important:

Whether or not you have passed an assignment, you should read your results notification carefully as it will give you an indication of areas that can be improved, should you need to prepare for your next assignment or work on a resubmission.

## Online results and feedback codes

Once logged in to the 'MyCII' area of the CII website, you will be given an overall mark with feedback codes and commentary.

You are given four feedback codes per result, (e.g. A, B, C, D) each linking to your performance against the four areas of marking shown opposite. The first feedback code relates to 'knowledge and understanding of the topic', the second 'application and analysis of the topic', and so on.

### Feedback comments

Feedback comments for fail assignments are accessible through RevisionMate.

Once your result has been received on MyCII, if you are unsuccessful in your attempt please login to RevisionMate to view your Turnitin report which will include your feedback comments. The 'Assignment feedback information' document is available to you through your RevisionMate account; this includes some FAQs on using the feedback comments.

## Marking criteria

As outlined in the marking grid document for your unit, you have been assessed against four areas:

- knowledge and understanding of the topic;
- application and analysis of the topic;
- the structure of your answer in terms of logic and coherence;
- the use of relevant work examples and/or further reading to support answers.

## Original content and referencing

The originality of your assignment and use of referencing can also affect the marks awarded:

- Did your assignment have a high reliance on sourced content, rather than your own original analysis? – the deeper the level of understanding demonstrated, the higher the marks that can be awarded. Please be wary of 'copy and pasting' material.
- Was sourced content referenced and cited? Would it be clear to a marker which content was your own work? – credit is given for identifying relevant content from Chartered Insurance Institute study texts and further reading; but it must be clear when sourced content is used, and when your own analysis begins and ends.

### Application and analysis

**Weighting: 50% of the 80 available marks**

Marks in this area are allocated as appropriate for the way in which you **applied** and **analysed** your factual knowledge. Evidence of analysis is seen in the way in which you:

1. added value by **linking** facts to relevant examples
2. **supported** your facts with relevant further reading
3. added value by **making relevant deductions, conclusions and recommendations** related to the question asked.

It is important to remember that the marker can only follow your thought process by what you have written. Thus your analysis must be clear for the reader to follow.

- *a clear and concise introduction*
- *the main body which has clear headings related to the question, and text which is **logical, clear, well-argued** and in which the various sections are well linked*
- *a **justified conclusion** which directly relates to the question, including good, clear recommendations, an appropriate ending, etc.*
